
# THIRD SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

It is only today that we embark on our journey through the gospel of Luke. Journey is a key theme in Luke's writings. He structures his gospel around Jesus' journey from Galilee to Jerusalem where the promise of salvation comes to fulfilment. His second volume, the Acts of the Apostles, is the story of the good news going from Jerusalem to the ends of the earth.

Along the way, Luke puts special emphasis on Jesus' outreach to the poor and weak, on God's mercy and forgiveness, on the importance of prayer, on the work of the Spirit and on women. He includes many parables found in no other gospel, such as the Good Samaritan and the (so-called) Prodigal Son. At the same time Luke uniquely presents a Jesus who is severely critical of the rich and the self-righteous and radically demanding of his disciples, especially with regard to detachment from worldly wealth.

# A READING FROM THE HOLY GOSPEL ACCORDING TO LUKE

Seeing that many others have undertaken to draw up accounts of the events that have taken place among us, exactly as these were handed down to us by those who from the outset were eyewitnesses and ministers of the word, I in my turn, after carefully going over the whole story from the beginning, have decided to write an ordered account for you, Theophilus, so that your Excellency may learn how well founded the teaching is that you have received.

Jesus, with the power of the Spirit in him, returned to Galilee; and his reputation spread throughout the countryside. He taught in their synagogues and everyone praised him. He came to Nazara, where he had been brought up and went into the synagogue on the Sabbath day as he usually did. He stood up to read and they handed him the scroll of the prophet Isaiah. Unrolling the scroll he found the place where it is written:

The spirit of the Lord has been given to me, for he has anointed me. He has sent me to bring the good news to the poor, to proclaim liberty to captives and to the blind new sight, to set the downtrodden free, to proclaim the Lord's year of favour.

He then rolled up the scroll, gave it back to the assistant and sat down. And all eyes in the synagogue were fixed on him. Then he began to speak to them, 'This text is being fulfilled today even as you listen.'

#### **COMMENTARY ON THE GOSPEL**

Today's gospel reading combines two beginnings—the beginning of Luke's gospel and the beginning of Jesus' public ministry. These are three chapters apart. In the first part, Luke is offering his fellow believers a robust resource to account for their faith in the context of the dominant Grego-Roman culture. In the second part there is an abrupt change of content and style. Luke presents this account of Jesus' preaching in Nazareth as an overture to the drama that will follow. In political terms it is Jesus' campaign speech.

#### **SPECIAL FEAST**

#### **June 28:** St Thomas Aquinas (1225-1274)

By universal consent, Thomas Aquinas is the preeminent spokesman of the Catholic tradition of reason and of divine revelation. He is one of the great teachers of the medieval Catholic Church, honored with the titles Doctor of the Church and Angelic Doctor.

At five he was given to the Benedictine monastery at Monte Cassino in his parents' hopes that he would choose that way of life and eventually become abbot. In 1239, he was sent to Naples to complete his studies. It was here that he was first attracted to Aristotle's philosophy.

By 1243, Thomas abandoned his family's plans for him and joined the Dominicans, much to his mother's dismay. On her order, Thomas was captured by his brother and kept at home for over a year.

Once free, he went to Paris and then to Cologne, where he finished his studies with Albert the Great. He held two professorships at Paris, lived at the court of Pope Urban IV, directed the Dominican schools at Rome and Viterbo, combated adversaries of the mendicants, as well as the Averroists, and argued with some Franciscans about Aristotelianism.

His greatest contribution to the Catholic Church is his writings. The unity, harmony, and continuity of faith and reason, of revealed and natural human knowledge, pervades his writings. One might expect Thomas, as a man of the gospel, to be an ardent defender of revealed truth. But he was broad enough, deep enough, to see the whole natural order as coming from God the Creator, and to see reason as a divine gift to be highly cherished.

The **Summa Theologiae** (or Theologica), his last and, unfortunately, uncompleted work, deals with the whole of Catholic theology. He stopped work on it after celebrating Mass on December 6, 1273. When asked why he stopped writing, he replied, "I cannot go on.... All that I have written seems to me like so much straw compared to what I have seen and what has been revealed to me." He died March 7, 1274 [Franciscan Media]
