So successful have the writers of the New Testament been in denigrating the Pharisees that even today the word 'Pharisee' is taken to refer to a person who is hypocritical and self-righteous. For the most part, Pharisees as a group as well as individual Pharisees are portrayed very negatively in the gospels and the Acts of the Apostles. How much this critical perspective is coloured by later hostility between the emerging Christian movement and traditional Jewish communities is unclear.

A READING FROM THE HOLY GOSPEL ACCORDING TO LUKE

Jesus spoke the following parable to some people who prided themselves on being virtuous and despised everyone else. 'Two men went up to the Temple to pray, one a Pharisee, the other a tax collector. The Pharisee stood there and said this prayer to himself, "I thank you, God, that I am not grasping, unjust, adulterous like the rest of mankind, and particularly that I am not like this tax collector here. I fast twice a week; I pay tithes on all I get." The tax collector stood some distance away, not daring even to raise his eyes to heaven; but he beat his breast and said, "God, be merciful to me, a sinner." This man, I tell you, went home again at rights with God; the other did not. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, but the man who humbles himself will be exalted.'

COMMENTARY ON THE GOSPEL

Luke alone includes the parable of the Pharisee and the tax collector. It goes hand in hand with the story of the unjust judge to present some of Jesus' teaching on prayer. The contrast between the two characters is deliberately extreme, so much so that we run the risk of not identifying ourselves with either of them.

The figure whose prayer is counterfeit is called a Pharisee, but this does not mean that all Pharisees were self-righteous, nor that self-righteousness was confined to this particular group or to the Jewish tradition. The temptation to be smug and self-satisfied lurks in every religious and moral system. Not only is the Pharisee's "prayer" self-absorbed but also full of contempt for others. Insofar as we image ourselves to be "self-made" we run the risk of the same kind of pride.

The parable does not demand that we judge ourselves to be unworthy creatures. But insofar as we acknowledge our failure to choose the good and our inability redeem ourselves, we can pray like the tax collector and be brought into right relationship with God. This is good news!



SPECIAL FEAST DAYS

November 1:



This feast began in the East to commemorate all martyrs and progressively spread to the West. It was first celebrated on this day in the eighth century and was soon widely observed. Honoured on this day now, are all holy men and women in glory with Christ, known or unknown, mighty or lowly, all whose lives were modelled on the Beatitudes and on the great commandment of love.

November 2:

The Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed



This day of commemoration began early in the Middle Ages with annual prayers for the dead in monastic communities.

Fixed on this day, it spread more widely after the tenth century and now ranks with the principal feast days in the liturgical calendar. Commonly known as All Souls, it expresses Christian faith in the common of saints and our need to pray for one another in the Church, especially those souls in purgatory "who have been buried in their human imperfection".

MOVIE REVIEW: Beautifully Broken

Solidly crafted and intelligently inspiring, *Beautifully Broken* skilfully entwines three narratives about faith, forgiveness, and fortuitous interconnections in a drama that likely will receive a warm reception from audiences with a taste for evangelical entertainment. ...

The movie begins during the early days of the Rwandan Genocide, as murderous bands of gun- and machete-wielding Hutu militia hunt and slaughter their Tutsi neighbours and co-workers. ...

Beautifully Broken enthusiastically and unabashedly celebrates the power of faith and forgiveness, and the potential for reconciliation and redemption. But it never comes across as simplistic (or simple-minded) in its boundless optimism. Rather, the movie is dramatically and emotionally satisfying because of its repeated insistence that, because this world and the people in it are what they are, placing faith in God actually can be viewed as an act of defiance. Which is probably why they call it "faith", not "certainty".
