A READING FROM THE HOLY GOSPEL **ACCORDING TO MARK**

With the coming of evening, Jesus said to his disciples, 'Let us cross over to the other side' And leaving the crowd behind they took him, just as he was, in the boat; and there were other boats with him. Then it began to blow a gale and the waves were breaking into the boat so that it was almost swamped. But he was in the stern, his head on the cushion, asleep They woke him and said to him 'Master, do you not care? We are going down!' And he woke up and rebuked the wind and said to the sea, 'Quiet now! Be calm!' And the wind dropped, and all was calm again. Then he said to them, 'Why are you so frightened? How is it that you have no faith?' They were filled with awe and said to one another, 'Who can this be? Even the wind and the sea obey him.'

COMMENTARY ON THE GOSPEL

Mark's collection of parables is followed by a series of events in which Jesus demonstrates divine power. He calms a storm, exorcises a demoniac, raised a dead girl to life, and heals an afflicted woman.

The calming of the storm is an episode that draws deeply on themes found the psalms, the prophets and wisdom literature: the human fear of unruly nature, especially stormy seas; sleep as a sign of trust in God; desperate prayer to God for deliverance; absolute divine power over nature; awe at the exercise of divine might. The Jesus of Mark's gospel is a figure of divine authority firmly situated in an ancient tradition.

Of all the evangelists Mark presents the sharpest contrast between the authority of Jesus, exercised over every form of demonic power, and the disciples' refusal to believe. In the course of his gospel Mark records a litany of rebukes delivered by Jesus to his disciples because of their unbelief. No flattery here or spin-doctoring! The story is short, vivid and dramatic.

THE NATIVITY OF **JOHN THE BAPTIST**

24 JUNE

John the Baptist spent his adult life preparing the way for Jesus, and proclaiming that "*the Kingdom of Heaven is close at hand.*" He was born to Zachary and Elizabeth, an elderly married couple. The Angel Gabriel had visited Zachary and told him that his wife would bear a child, even though she was already past the child-bearing age.

Elizabeth was Mary's cousin and Zachary was a priest of the Temple in Jerusalem. As a baby in the womb, John recognized Jesus' presence in Mary's womb when Mary visited Elizabeth soon after the Annunciation. Both women were pregnant at the same time.

John was probably born at Ain-Karim, which is southwest of Jerusalem. As a young adult, he lived as a hermit in the desert of Judea until about A.D. 27. When he was 30, he began to preach on the banks of the Jordan, calling for repentance and baptising people in the river waters. When Jesus came to John to be baptised, John recognised Him as the Messiah and baptised Him, saying: "It is I who need baptism from you."

John continued to preach after Jesus was baptised, but was imprisoned not long after by Herod Antipas, after he denounced the king's adulterous marriage with Herodias, wife of his half-brother Philip.

John was beheaded at the request of Salome, daughter of Herodias. Many came to know Jesus through John, namely the Apostles Andrew and John.

Parish Priest (1983 – 1989)

Fr. Kevin Condon died on Monday 14th June at Nazareth House in Camberwell, Victoria. He was born on January 31, 1932 in Glenroe, County Limerick near Ballylanders and not far from Mitchelstown. He was christened Liam and was given the name Kevin when he joined the Dominicans in 1949. He was ordained a priest in July 1956.

Fr. Kevin came to Australia in November 1960 and travelled under the assisted passage scheme. It meant the fare cost the princely sum of £5.00. It was Fr Antonius Costello who suggested that he go to Australia. In 1974 there were 23 Irish Dominicans working in Australia, five of whom had translocated to the Australian province.

Fr. Kevin was Parish Priest in the Dominican Parishes of North Adelaide, Wahroonga (NSW), Camberwell as well as being PP here at Doubleview. He was a tireless worker in the parishes but also in other diverse areas such as fundraising for the building of the house of studies in Canberra in the 1960s, where he was later superior.

In 2008 he was appointed chaplain in Nazareth House at Ballarat in Victoria. But due to ill-health he had to retire. He duly recovered and was told by his consultant that it was God and golf that were responsible for his recovery.

Fr. Kevin was an accomplished golfer and had a lifelong interest in sports, especially support for his beloved West Coast Eagles, and an appreciation for cricket that many Irish friars shared after living in Australia.

May God grant Fr. Kevin eternal peace.

MOVIE REVIEW

“Spirit Untamed”

Excerpt from ‘the Record’ by Sister Rupprecht/CNS

“Pedigree is important where horses are concerned, and the equine-themed animated adventure *Spirit Untamed* (Universal) comes with a multimedia lineage.

It descends both from the 2002 film *Spirit: Stallion of the Cimarron* and the ongoing Netflix series *Spirit Riding Free*, which first aired in 2017.

Visually stunning, the new feature, directed by Elaine Bogan with co-director Ennio Torresan Jr, is also family-friendly.

It can, accordingly, be recommended for all but small fry, who might find its action scenes too frightening.

Like its predecessors, *Spirit Untamed* takes viewers back to the era when wild horses still roamed the West. This time, however, the humans who interact with them experience healing from their own hurts even as they try to rescue the majestic creatures from a set of bad-guy wranglers. ...

Screenwriters Aury Wallington, Kristin Hahn and Katherine Nolfi work relevant themes for a youthful audience into their script, including the importance of friendship, teamwork, respect for nature, education, and love of family. The ethnic diversity of their characters – and of the cast – is another plus.

All in all, few will want to say nay to so endearing a neigh-sayer as *Spirit*.

The film contains perilous situations.
