A READING FROM THE HOLY GOSPEL ACCORDING TO MARK

James and John, the sons of Zebedee, approached Jesus. 'Master,' they said to him 'we want you to do us a favour.' He said to them, 'What is it you want me to do for you?' They said to him, 'Allow us to sit one at your right hand and the other at your left in your glory.' 'You do not know what you are asking' Jesus said to them. 'Can you drink the cup that I must drink, or be baptised with the baptism with which I must be baptised?' They replied, 'We can.' Jesus said to them, 'The cup that I must drink you shall drink and with the baptism with which I must be baptised you shall be baptised, but as for seats at my right hand or my left, these are not mine to grant; they belong to those to whom they have been allotted.'

When the other ten heard this they began to feel indignant with James and John, so Jesus called them to him and said to them, 'You know that among the pagans their so-called rulers lord it over them, and their great men make their authority felt. This is not to happen among you. No; anyone who wants to become great among you must be your servant, and anyone who wants to be first among you must be slave to all. For the Son of Man himself did not come to be served but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many.'

COMMENTARY ON THE GOSPEL

Anyone who reads the gospel of Mark thoroughly will be struck by the paradox it presents. On the one hand we encounter Jesus as a figure of immense power; he rebukes demons, calms the sea, and teaches with astonishing authority. On the other hand he steadfastly renounces the use of power. He calls himself a servant and insists that his disciples make themselves slave to all.

We see in Jesus that being a servant does not mean being weak and ineffectual. That is something Jesus never was. He impressed people time and time again with his authority because he never sought power over others. Being so free, so centred, and so attuned to the power of love, he could put all his capacities at the service of others' well being.

SPECIAL FEAST DAY

October 22: ST JOHN PAUL II

Karol Jozef Wojtyla was born on May 18 1920 in the Polish town of Wadowice, 35 miles southwest of Krakow. After high school, the future pope enrolled at Krakow's Jagiellonian University, where he studied philosophy and literature and performed in a theatre group. During World War II, Nazis occupied Krakow and closed the university, forcing Wojtyla to seek work in a quarry and, later, a chemical factory. By 1941, his mother, father, and only brother had all died, leaving him the sole surviving member of his family.

Although Wojtyla had been involved in the church his whole life, it was not until 1942 that he began seminary training. When the war ended, he returned to school at Jagiellonian to study theology, becoming an ordained priest in 1946. He went on to complete two doctorates and became a professor of moral theology and social ethics. On July 4, 1958, at the age of 38, he was appointed auxiliary bishop of Krakow by Pope Pius XII. He later became the city's archbishop, where he spoke out for religious freedom while the church began the Second Vatican Council, which would revolutionise Catholicism.

He was made a cardinal in 1967, taking on the challenges of living and working as a Catholic priest in communist Eastern Europe.

When Pope John Paul I died in 1978 after only a 34-day reign, few suspected Wojtyla would be chosen to replace him. But, after seven rounds of balloting, the Sacred College of Cardinals chose the 58-year-old, and he became the first-ever Slavic pope and the youngest to be chosen in 132 years.

Cardinal Wojtyla took the name John Paul II, and became history's most well-traveled pope and the first non-Italian to hold the position since the 16th century.

In February 2005, the pope was hospitalised with complications from the flu. He died two months later.

He was succeeded by Joseph Cardinal Ratzinger, who became Pope Benedict XVI. Benedict XVI began the process to beatify John Paul II in May 2005, and in 2014 John Paul II was canonised.
