DIVINE MERCY SUNDAY



On the Second Sunday of Easter of the Jubilee Year 2000, at the Mass for the Canonization of St. Faustina Kowalska, Pope John Paul II declared the Sunday after Easter be called "Divine Mercy Sunday".

St. Faustina was a Polish nun who received visions from Jesus, including one of Jesus wearing a white garment with beams of red and white coming from His heart, which came to be known as the image of Divine Mercy.

READING FROM THE HOLY GOSPEL ACCORDING TO JOHN

In the evening of that same day, the first day of the week, the doors were closed in the room where the disciples were, for fear of the Jews. Jesus came and stood among them. He said to them, 'Peace be with you,' and showed them his hands and his side. The disciples were filled with joy when they saw the Lord, and he said to them again, 'Peace be with you.'

'As the Father sent me
so am I sending you'

After saying this he breathed on them and said;

'Receive the Holy Spirit,
for those whose sins you forgive, they are forgiven;
for those whose sins you retain, they are retained.'

Thomas, called the Twin, who was one of the Twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. When the disciples said, 'We have seen the Lord,' he answered, 'Unless I see the holes that the nails made in his hands and can put my finger into the holes they made, and unless I can put my hand into his side, I refuse to believe.' Eight days later the disciples were in the house again and Thomas was with them. The doors were closed, but Jesus came in and stood among them. 'Peace be with you,' he said. Then he spoke to Thomas, 'Put your finger here; look, here are my hands. Give me your hand; put it into my side. Doubt no longer but believe.' Thomas replied, 'My Lord and my God!' Jesus said to him:

'You believe because you can see me.

Happy are those who have not seen and yet believe.'

There were many other signs that Jesus worked and the disciples saw, but they are not recorded in this book.

These are recorded so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing this you may have life through his name.

COMMENTARY ON THE GOSPEL

By way of exception, the Lectionary provides only the one gospel text for this Sunday in the three-year cycle, presumably because of its perceived importance in the tradition. It takes us from the evening of Easter Day to John's concluding statement about his gospel-writing purpose.

The reading falls into three parts, each of which provides much food for thought. Part one is John's account of the risen Lord's appearance to his fearful disciples and his giving them the Spirit and their mission of mercy. Part two is the story of Thomas the apostle's dramatic conversion from scepticism to full-blooded faith. Part three is John's sign-off.

It begins at night in a closed room, it proceeds with a mission for the apostles in their time, it envisages further generations coming to believe, and it finishes with a hint of eternity.

SPECIAL FEASTS

April 26: **ST MARK, THE EVANGELIST**

St Mark is usually identified with the John Mark whose mother's house in Jerusalem was a meeting place for the apostles, and with the young man who followed Christ after his arrest. He was a cousin of Saint Barnabas. He accompanied Saint Paul on his first missionary journey and later followed him to Rome. He was also a companion of Saint Peter and traditionally credited with the gospel which reflects Peter's teaching and memoirs. He died in about the year 74.

April 29: **ST CATHERINE OF SIENA**

Born at Siena (Italy) in 1347, Catherine was committed to the practice of prayer and penance from an early age. She entered the **Dominican** Third Order while still an adolescent. She became an influential spiritual leader and made strenuous efforts to reconcile Church and state and to reform the Roman papacy. In a series of letters, Catherine exhorted the pope to address the problems of the church and charged him to return to Rome.

One year later, in 1377, after Catherine had visited with him in Avignon, Pope Gregory XI finally returned to Rome. It was the great moment of her public life.

She is remembered for her holiness and determination and, though she never learned to write, for the quality of her teachings. She is also remembered as a mystic and reformer of religious life.

Catherine died in Rome at the age of 33. In 1970 the Roman Catholic Church declared her a doctor of the church — a title given since the Middle Ages to certain saints whose writing or preaching is outstanding for guiding the faithful in all periods of the Church's history.




Dear Parishioners and Visitors,
