LENTEN REFLECTION

Fr Tom Cassidy spoke to a room full of parishioners on Thursday evening, giving us plenty of food to reflect on in our Lenten journey.

Fr Tom related three stories from the Old Testament showing how they overflow into the New Testament and then into our own lives today. The Exodus story is about freedom from slavery, and we too need release from slavery to things which draw us away from God. The Babylonian Exile and return story brings home to us our being led by God to our true home in heaven. The final story is God reconciling humanity to himself by his self sacrifice to the Father on our behalf. We reap the benefit especially through our union with Christ in the sacraments which make his self offering present to us and effective in our lives.

PALM SUNDAY

OF THE PASSION OF THE LORD

The Palm Procession will leave from the Rosary Garden at 9:45am into the Church for 10:00am Mass.

Every year on this Sunday the story of Jesus' betrayal, passion and death is told at length. The reading is taken in turn from one of the synoptic gospels - Matthew, Mark or Luke - because we always read John's account on Good Friday. This year we read from Mark. Mark begins his account in the house of Simon the Leper and leaves us at the tomb of the Lord where the entrance is secured with a stone.

GOOD FRIDAY COLLECTION



The annual collection for the support of the church in the Holy Land will take place on Good Friday, March 29th. This collection promotes the missionary work of the Church in the Holy Land by providing welfare assistance to local Christians in areas such as health, education, employment, housing. Parishes, and orphanages. It is also used to maintain over 70 churches and shrines associated with the life of Jesus. Due to the ongoing war, the Church and people of the Holy Land are still struggling with reduced income due to fewer pilgrims and lower church attendance around the world.

The reality for the Holy Land mission is that they will continue to face challenges financial and spiritual and so we again ask Catholics around the world again to be as generous as possible, with their financial support as well as the spiritual support.

Please remember the Christians of the Holy Land on Good Friday.

The Paschal Triduum



The evening Mass of the Lord's Supper gets the Paschal Triduum under way. The liturgies of Holy Thursday, Good Friday and the Easter Vigil are three parts of a single whole.

Tonight's liturgy takes the familiar form of a Eucharist, but also includes the transfer of the Sacrament for Good Friday Holy Communion. The transfer offers us an invitation to prepare prayerfully for the next day's service.

There is no dismissal tonight.

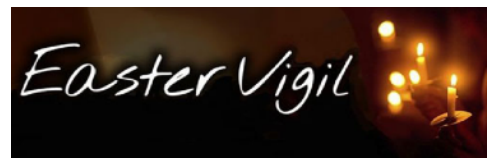


The liturgy of Good Friday is both solemn and simple. The shape of the service is clear. It has three distinct components: *Liturgy of the Word* (with readings, homily and prayers), *Adoration of the Holy Cross*, and *Holy Communion*.

The solemnity of the celebration is reinforced by the silence with which it is surrounded.

On no other occasion in the liturgical year does a service begin and end in silence, without greeting or dismissal.

For all its solemnity, the Good Friday liturgy is not sad or mournful. On the contrary, what is being celebrated is the triumph of the cross.



Fire, light, water and oil, bread and wine, a common table – these are the elemental symbols which thrill our hearts on this night of nights, the Easter Vigil.

“This is the night, when Christ broke the prison-bars of death and rose victorious from the underworld.”

This is the night of life, of light, of love. This is the night on which light blazes in the darkness, the night on which we wait and watch and listen, the night we bathe in the waters of life, the night we break bread at table with the risen Lord.

OFFERTORY PROCESSION

The Offertory Procession has been reinstated at all weekend Masses. You may be asked if you could bring the bread and wine from a table at the back of the church to the priest at the front. We hope parishioners will accept the opportunity to be involved in our Masses in this way.

COMMENTARY ON THE GOSPEL

Dear Parishioners and Visitors.

St Mark's account of Jesus' Passion is telling us that there are two ways of understanding what is going on. The first is more obvious: his enemies are bringing about Jesus' arrest, trial and execution. Even his friends betray, deny and desert him.

The second way looks more deeply at the same events through the eyes of faith. And it sees God the Father at work carrying out his plan for the re-creation of us and our universe. Precisely through and in the life, suffering, death and resurrection of his Son, the Father is striking the decisive death blow to the reign of evil in our world and establishing the kingdom of God's love in its place.

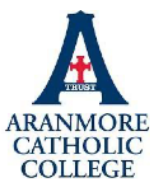
Such is the power of God to bring good out of evil. That, I think, is what we are meant to be thinking about this week.

It is by reflecting on this power of God to bring good out of evil that we can learn to accept the hardships in our own lives and see God working in and through them to achieve the fulfillment of his plan. In this way we share in the saving work of his Son, and therefore becoming fit for the company of God, and his angels and saints in heaven.

One final but important thought: Mark makes clear in his gospel that God can and does bring good not only out of "natural" evils, but even out of sin, as in today's gospel. Do you remember Jesus' words about the woman who poured ointment over his feet: "Her sins' her many sins, must have been forgiven because she has loved so much." Under the influence of God's grace, even sin can lead to greater love.
